I first heard of Jesus Caritas from my (then) spiritual director as I prepared to be ordained as a priest. He encouraged me to join his group in Arundel and Brighton Diocese and the group gave me amazing support and introduced me to inspirational fellow clergy.

My pilgrimage to priesthood is perhaps unusual. Since leaving school, or shortly after, I've been a member of the Lay Community of St Benedict (previously the Worth Abbey Lay Community) and currently serve as chaplain to the community. I married Jo and we were blessed with three daughters, the middle of whom sadly died when she was 7. Louise remains a precious member of the family, albeit in heaven! My other daughters, Theo and Louise are now parents and I'm the proud grandfather of four youngsters. I was called to the Permanent Diaconate and served in Worth Abbey Parish and as Airport Chaplain at Gatwick. Tragically, Jo died some 20 years ago and after some time, I discerned a call to be ordained as a priest. I served in Crawley parish for 7 years before retiring up to Suffolk 6 years ago and now belong to the East Anglian group. I would like to thank Stephen Squires for his term of office as National Responsible and ask your prayers as I take over from him this autumn.

It was with the understanding that he would have such support from other brothers that Joe Deegan, a priest of the Diocese of Meath, serving in Clara, Co. Offaly accepted the role of responsible.

Joe thanked the outgoing National Responsible, Niall Ahern, for his contributions since he assumed the role at the end of 2018, especially his bringing many priests who had not been Fraternity members to share in the annual Jesus Caritas retreats. Niall has kindly agreed to work with Joe in organising the annual summer retreat.



Dear Brothers,



Fraternal Greetings from St. Brigid's Parish, Clara, Co. Offaly and I hope and pray that this email finds you well.

I feel humbled (and that won't do me any harm!) to have been chosen as Irish National Responsable of Jesus Caritas Priest Fraternity for another six year term. I accepted the role before Liam O'Cuiv some eighteen years ago and needless to say that the world, the church, the Fraternity and I'm sure all of us have changed and moved into a very different reality since then; post-Covid and all the stuff that keeps changing the context of our lives.

At the outset, on behalf of all of us in Jesus Caritas Ireland I want to express our sincere gratitude to Niall for his humble, dedicated and generous service to the Fraternity over the last six (plus) years. Especially for his innovative 'broadening of the horizons' to so many brother priests who are not 'members' of Jesus Caritas Fraternity. Happily Niall has agreed to continue to work with me on organizing the summer retreat in Mullaghmore from year to year. Thank you again Niall for undertaking to continue this service.

I very much appreciate the fact that some other brothers have accepted to make my role easier by undertaking other services to the National Fraternity:

- * James has kindly taken on the job of 'minding the purse' in the role of Treasurer. (Thanks to Philip for taking care of that job up to now).
- * Alan and Liam have 'volunteered' to link up and work with Bob Rainbow, the editor of the joint British/Irish 'Be Brothers' (See back page.) They will be delighted to receive any news or reflections you wish to send them in writing for publication.
- * Raymond & Gerry will do some work on promotion of the Fraternity and keeping in touch with the Episcopal Conference (if that is required?).

Comments by Peter Codd (Portsmouth fraternity) on the proposed new founding documents of Jesus Caritas internationally.

The draft of the proposed updates for the JESUS CARITAS DIRECTORY, which is on the agenda of the International Responsibles Meeting as I write (May, 2025), prompts this article.

Chapter II, which begins with Article 3 of the Document, is headed: 'At the Cross-Roads of the World and the Church'.

Summarising the four paragraphs which follow, it urges that members of Jesus Caritas must play an active part in humanity's task in building a new world in the teeth of tension, disappointment and violence. Priests must share peoples cares and their joys, to struggle with them for freedom and to search with them for hope.

The Fraternity must help us to recognise and to undertake this responsibility through the Review of Life and through Prayer. The Review of Life will bring each brother to look again at his life and will bring each brother to look again at his faith, his ministry and his identification with his people.

There has been a tendency in my own monthly Reviews, to be introspective to the extent that I have concentrated on life's experiences over the past, rather than recent relationships and actions; maybe that was helpful and appropriate for me up until now. I wonder if this tendency is shared by others. Anyway, I see this as a personal call to redirect my monthly Reviews, so as to reflect my involvement and how well I engage, with others, in today's challenges.

Article 5 in the Document is about concern for our Common Home and makes reference to 'Laudate Si' and 'Laudate Deum'. It then goes on to say: "The sensitivity of our priestly fraternity to this reality must be manifest above all in our life-stile, but also through our participation in concrete projects and above all through our attention to the poorest, who are most affected by climate change. There is mention specifically of working for peace, and protection of human rights, especially the issue of migration and human trafficking.

Priests in active ministry within parishes will have their work cut out, so that involvement in these issues may be largely limited to whatever their Parish is involved in. We who are retired may have scope to choose more widely where to participate.

One specific thought struck me: we receive online the Journal published by the Little Sisters of Charles de Foucauld, with reports from various parts of the world. A retired priest in a fraternity might be able to keep contact with one of these Houses abroad, where poverty is acute and promote some sort of practical support through his brother priests, without making burdensome demands on those already heavily committed - just a thought!

A Letter of Gratitude

Dear Brothers,

"If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is "thank you," it will be enough." Meister Eckhart Coming from a celebration of life after death in remembrance of Jesus and of Pope Francis' death that has left footprints of his courageous life, in solidarity with the association of the spiritual family of St Charles de Foucauld who are now in a meeting at Tarres, Spain (our brother Matthias Kiel is representing me) and, while waiting with anticipation for the conclave in Rome and for our general assembly in Buenos Aires, I am writing to you this final letter as your servant brother in the Fraternity for the past six years.

Six years ago, I could not imagine myself doing this task. I come from a country that is like Nazareth, very small, insignificant, in the periphery of the world. The thought of being the general responsible was both overwhelming and frightening to me at the least. But slowly yet gently, I have learned through the years that this is not about me but about God using me in my poverty and in spite of me. I have wrestled many times praying with Brother Charles the prayer of abandonment while holding the Fraternity in prayer until my heart has mellowed from all my illusions and fears. I could only look back at the 6 years with profound gratitude for all the teaching, humbling and challenging moments that have made me where I am now as a work-in-progress universal brother following Jesus of Nazareth in the footsteps of Brother Charles.

Thank you very much for trusting me and my team with this man-

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date to serve and animate the fraternities around the world with all our gifts and limitations. Our insecurity to lead has moved us to listen to you – your realities and concerns – through the online survey where we have learned that our fragility as Fraternity urges us to seek one another with firm resolve and not to resign in self-sufficiency where we try to live our lives and ministries like "lone rangers." Our fragile state has become a new pathway to forging real fraternities where everyone celebrates, challenges, listens and depends on the growth of each other. Above all, thank you very much for your individual witness of life, your courageous fire and zeal for God, the poor and the marginalized, your firm resolve to be a brother to all for the sake of Jesus and the Gospel and your commitment to live the fraternal life as diocesan priests in the footsteps of Brother Charles.

The authentic joy that comes from Jesus' resurrection sets us all on a humbling yet joy-filled pilgrimage together as spiritbrothers, patiently yet courageously seeking always for what nurtures our hearts amidst the overwhelmingly darkness and confusion of our world, inviting us to listen first before we talk, to understand first before we judge, to preach the Gospel with our lives, to see the face of Jesus in the poor, to heed



the cry of Mother Earth and to face life's challenges with a heart fixed on the coming of the Kingdom in our midst.

Like the apostles, seeing an empty tomb with hearts overwhelmed by the confusion, violence and disillusionment of the things that have happened has blinded them from seeing reality with a sense of reflective distance, contemplative wonder and awe. After the resurrection, we are not sent to engage the world like conquerors and little messiahs who disregard the weak in order for the strong to control and dominate. No, we are summoned as lovers, brothers and friends to value every human experience as a place of encounter, to listen to the marginalized, to embrace those who are despised, to challenge the strong, waiting with patience and hope for new life to unfold from the goodness of every human heart and from every human experience.

In this jubilee year, we are invited to hope as pilgrims together. The late Pope Francis, in his October 2013 morning meditation, had given two contrasting icons for hope: the anchor and pangs of childbirth. When we are anchored to "an artificial everything is comfortable" a fitting icon for hope is that of creation "has been groaning inwardly as we wait. We are lagoon we ourselves have made... where secure. This is not hope". Rather, the labor at childbirth. The whole of together in travail until now; we groan waiting." Waiting for new life to unfold is authentic hope. Hope, then, "is intimately involved in the dynamic of giving life" which often "remains invisible and hidden to human eyes."

Yet we know that the Spirit is at work quietly, gently, patiently. "*The Spirit is at work in us. He works like a mustard seed, which is small but full of life and power until it grows into a tree. This is how the Spirit works.*" May the Spirit, the Giver of Life, continue to renew our church and world today in surprising ways and may we have the heart to see it, one experience at a time. His way will always be hidden beneath the drama of our time. We need to be interiorly quiet to see that. This is what our spiritual means of daily adoration, desert day, review of life, daily meditation has prepared us.

A profound testimony

Fr. Cathal Price generously shares

what our fraternity did for him.

Dear Brothers,

I offer this testimony in utter thanksgiving for the gift of the Fraternity of Jesus Caritas in my life.

My name is Fr. Cathal Price of the Dublin Diocese.

I'm recently 90 years old by the sheer grace of God.

At present I am in Hospital and rehab for the last 12 weeks due to a severe fall. A very painful process.

My background.

My parents Peg and Michael were both very committed to the cause of 1916 onwards.

My Father was committed to the IRA and all his life filled with a great sense of justice and love of the downtrodden.

He lived in excommunication until his sudden death when I was turning 9 years old. This had a traumatic effect on my life right up my late forties.

My mother was a woman of great faith who prayed for me all her life (94). I buried my anger and grief and it affected my relationship with her.

I became very independent and driven and after ordination always trying to prove myself and be on top of things seeking to be loved.

Up to my forties I searched for love in many sexual relationships with women hating what I was doing running to confession hanging on to the Mass.

Prayer was mechanical.

I was filled with a deep sense of shame to be a priest so I avoided priests' company. This was covered up.

do with me what you will. Whatever you do, I thank you. I am ready for all,

Then a moment of real grace!

I met Gerry Reynolds who suggested I join the fraternity and arranged I joined a fraternity group. Feeling unworthy, but with solid brothers who prayed with me and for me and gradually brought me to the Hour of Adoration and the Scriptures.

So I accepted the invitation to join the monthly annual Retreat in Clifden. These were the early days of fraternity where I met the spiritual giants like Peter Lenas and Gerry Reynolds and the singer troubadour Jim Murphy.

They introduced me to the life of Br Charles and the spirit of abandonment but above all with an acceptance of me as I was.

More and more I hungered for their fraternity; the adoration and the daily sharing of the scriptures which gradually were coming alive to me.

Then on one of the Desert days I set out to climb one of the Bens following a stream to it's source. As I climbed I was confronted by all the events of my life, the shame, the self pity, the failures.

When I reached the top I found I had let so much go, learning how to abandon myself to the Mercy of my Brother Jesus.

Then I heard the words: "I have called you by name"

As I absorbed these words I allowed myself to be filled with the utter Love of my crazy God.

Returning I could share with the brothers my story which I had retained hidden up to then.

Their acceptance of me overwhelmed me, awakening the great desire of Br. Charles to seek the lowest place beside Jesus who had chosen the lowest place.

That desire and the prayer of abandonment which I recite early each morning remains my deepest desire which enabled me to take the steps to be gradually healed and released.

Staying close to our monthly meeting of our Fraternity for the next 35 years has been a cornerstone

leading me to the Devotion of Divine Mercy and being used by the Lord to promote it for over 25 years.

He then led me to promote the new Devotion to the Mother of Divine Mercy to bring about the proclamation of the first Marian dogma still to be accomplished.



We would like to thank, first of all, our Argentinian brothers for their warm welcome and their readiness in introducing to us the people and culture of their country. We will not forget the cultural evening, the trip to the Delta of Paraná River, the visit to the centre of Buenos Aires and to the shrine of Our Lady of Luján. A WOUNDED WORLD

In a world wounded by divisions, polarisations, ambitions for power and the violence of wars, the message on Universal Fraternity is more necessary than ever. Pope Francis understood this. His words and gestures demonstrate it. We therefore, feel a strong call to be witnesses and builders of fraternity both in our presbyteria and in the societies and cultures in which each of us is present, through greater closeness and service to the poor, migrants, the marginalised and victims of all kinds of abuse.

Fraternity is possible! We have experienced this in this Assembly despite the diversity of languages, cultures and pastoral experiences. Each day has been marked by praying together the Lauds, Adoration and the celebration of Eucharist, which has allowed us to live these days in a climate of attentive listening, understanding, joy, acceptance and dialogue. This is how we have been able to share our personal stories, reflect on the topics presented, listen attentively to the reports presented and work on our Statutes and our Directory.



OUR FRATERNITIES

The reports we have heard have shown us that in several countries in Europe and America our fraternities are ageing. This is not the case in Africa and Asia. We must therefore give more spiritual and financial support to the fraternities on both continents. In the countries of Europe and America,



we need to renew our efforts to make Brother Charles de Foucauld known in our presbyteries and invite priests, deacons and seminarians to join our Fraternity. We therefore feel a strong call to found new fraternities and to reawaken those that are dormant.

To do this, we need a great deal of creativity and greater fidelity to the charism of Brother Charles and to the means of spiritual growth that

our Fraternity has. Our witness of a simple, fraternal, joyful and committed life with the poor, which springs from our close relationship with the Risen Christ, will always be the best way to attract new members to our fraternities. We are convinced that Brother Charles' spirituality, centered on the Gospel and the Eucharist, celebrated and adored, is the spirituality that has ongoing relevance.

THE ELECTION OF LEO XIV

During our Assembly, the conclave was held in Rome to elect a new successor to Peter, Pope Leo XIV. Far from distracting us, his election has confirmed us in the path which the Holy Spirit is guiding his Church: a renewed missionary impulse, an ever greater commitment to justice and peace, and a greater participation of all the baptised in the life of the Church. We believe that fraternity is expressed in the synodal way of living our faith and our belonging to the Church, which is why we feel called to promote this ecclesial style in our parishes, Christian communities, movements and other pastoral settings in which we carry out our ministry.






